Chakra Chatter 101: Wheels of Life (6 weeks: Oct 15 – Nov 19)

This course is based on the book *Wheels of Life* by Anodea Judith.

Learn about the Energetic Esoteric Anatomy System and structures of the seven Major Chakras. Explore how becoming more aware of and responsible for these human evolutionary systems will awaken you to higher dimensions of self-expression, self-healing and creativity. Comprehensive Planning in the State of Washington: An Introduction to the Growth Management Act (3 weeks: Nov 5 – Nov 19)

What does state law require for local zoning and land use in cities and counties? How do we protect farmland and wetlands while planning for new development? And why do we have to plan for population growth? All of these issues and more are addressed by the state Growth Management Act and implemented through local Comprehensive Plans. This course will provide background on the legal basis of planning in Washington State, the goals and requirements of the Growth Management Act, and how cities and counties address those requirements through their Comprehensive Plans. Communities throughout Washington State are now engaged in updating their plans—with Skagit County plans due by the end of 2025. Residents who want to engage in those update processes may especially benefit from the context this course will provide.

Instructor: Ryan Walters

Ryan Walters has been a municipal and land use attorney for 17 years, formerly as a deputy prosecuting attorney and planning director, and has been a member of the Anacortes City Council since 2012. Currently in private practice, Ryan consults for a number of local governments and the State of Washington on municipal and land use law and permit process reform.

Preventing Financial Fraud (6 weeks: Oct 17 - Nov 21)

Join us to learn how to protect yourself and your loved ones from financial fraud! Learn the most common financial scams, new fraud trends on how criminals are using technology to access private data, and the actions you can take to rebuild if you fall victim to fraud.

You will also hear stories from Anacortes citizens who have been impacted by financial fraud.

The U.S. Office of Justice reports that financial fraud is the number one crime committed against seniors in the U.S. Additionally, in 2022 the National Council on Aging reported more than 88,000 complaints of fraud, resulting in more than \$3 billion in losses from people 60. Don't be a statistic!

Racheal is Vice President and Community Bank Manager at Banner Bank in Anacortes. She will be joined in instruction by additional Banner Bank staff.

Jane Austen's Pride and Prejudice (3 weeks: Nov 7 - Nov 21)

This course is about the great Jane Austen not taught by literature professors but by two women who consider themselves "Jane-ites". The class is designed for Jane enthusiasts and those who wonder "what's the big deal about Jane Austen?"

Jane interprets, critiques and comments on the landed gentry in England in her six novels. This class will focus on her most famous novel, *Pride and Prejudice*.

We will explore the Regency period (1811-1820) in England. Topics covered will be a short biography of JA, the wars of the period, the city of London, social rankings (landowners, military and clergy), amusements such as reading, walking

and balls, and, of course, marriage. Marriage, the big question of the day. Did women marry out of necessity, for security or love or did they remain spinsters?

Suggested reading: *Pride and Prejudice* by Jane Austen and *Jane Austen for Dummies* by Joan Klingel Ray.

Suggested viewing: the 2020 *Pride and Prejudice* with Kyra Knightly and Matthew Macfadyen.

Jane delights me with her wit, wisdom and astute observations of human beings. She is very much like William Shakespeare in her powers of observation.

Walter and I have been married 51 years this year and we have two adult children and two grandchildren, all of whom live in Europe. We have lived in Anacortes (wonderful place) for 12 years. Our love story is kind of romantic but not as good as Darcy's and Elizabeth's.

My hope for this class is that we can all become teachers and students as we explore the wonderful Jane Austen together.
